### From the Shelter . . .

#### Dear Friends,

Has it been a year already? As I completed my first year as Shelter Manager, it was amazing to think of all of the progress that has been made in the past 12 months. What struck me most as I pondered this was all of the people who have come alongside of me to make this progress possible. People of many different walks of life have given their time, talents and money to make life for shelter animals better. A sense of extreme gratitude comes over me when I stop and think of how many people care.

This year we are embarking on some new adventures. Physical changes at the campus, new programs designed to improve the quality of care and life for the animals and to improve our adoption rate. It's hard to know where to begin to share all of this with you. Let's start with the physical. Over the next few months you will notice the big trailer known as Cat ISO disappear and a couple of new buildings appear in its place. Based on feedback from a pair of assessors from No Kill SC, it was decided that this structure is not suitable as housing for animals. Their evaluation also helped us to identify a proper location for an intake area (currently the medical building) and a way to define our public side and restricted access side. As part of the assessment process we identified several weaknesses in policies and protocols, so those too are being written or revised.

We will be soon kicking off our Doggie Date program, which will allow people to come and take a dog out for a day, and our Adoption Ambassador program, which will place some of our harder to place pets in foster who will commit to finding a home for their foster pet. We also are starting play groups with the dogs. All healthy dogs will have time each day to socialize with other dogs and get out to play! We expect to have our new Adoption/Rescue Coordinator position filled soon which will allow us to extend our Saturday hours. All of these improvements will get animals out of the kennels and hopefully into homes much quicker.

So, if you haven't volunteered at the shelter yet or haven't been out in a while, please accept this as your invitation to come out and get involved. Over the next few months, we will be posting for volunteers for specific help, items needed for our overhaul, and ongoing needs to provide enrichment for our pets. I am sure there's a way anyone can help if they have the desire. We will certainly appreciate it but more importantly, the pets in our care will realize a better quality of life and that is what FoCCAS is all about!
