# Happy Birthday to Us!

It's hard to believe that 10 years ago, Friends of the Colleton County Animal Shelter was just an idea brought to fruition by William Lyons, Pam Hay, Nicole Herrera, and other community members interested in helping the animals of Colleton County.

These Colleton pioneers formed a group to help support the animals at the shelter. At the time, the county had cut the shelter's budget yet again and the live release rate was only 11%. Today, for 2019, the live release rate is 85.7%.

What a difference a decade makes! From the very beginning things started to get better in Colleton County. FoCCAS began raising awareness with change boxes in supporting businesses and for a while, that was the main source of income. Once the organization was settled, more ideas and more money started coming in to help the animals.

In 2012, the first Paws at the Plantation raised over \$10,000 for the animals and this fundraiser has been going strong ever since. Walk & Wag, our fall event celebrating our dogs and community, began in 2014. Each year, our Walk & Wag t-shirts are worn, not only at the event, but also around town.

In 2013, FoCCAS started the first of our community spay/neuter initiatives offering \$25 off vouchers for surgeries at local vet offices. In 2014, FoCCAS partnered with SNAC (the Hilton Head Humane Association's low cost spay/neuter clinic) to provide a low cost surgery and transportation for the animals from the Walterboro area.


In 2015, Janice Young, Carol Armentrout, and Dr. Rebecca Hughes started presenting the Colleton Animal Commitment Education (CACE) program teaching responsible pet ownership to 4<sup>th</sup> graders in Colleton County. Each spring, 4K and 5K students learn safety around known and unknown dogs. (see CACE article)

Just ten years after a small, but mighty, group of volunteers founded FoCCAS, we have grown to over 100 active volunteers and many more community supporters. In 2018, FoCCAS supported the shelter by supplementing the county budget for spay/neuter of shelter animals, vaccines, and other supplies by \$35,956; and our contribution for community spay/neuter initiatives was \$34,528 to alter 923 owned pets or community cats.

#### We've come a long way baby!

This summer, Friends of Colleton County Animal Shelter has a goal to raise \$10,000 to construct a FoCCAS Adoption Area at the shelter to create a comfortable family-friendly area for potential adopters to meet the adoptable animals.

Join us in supporting our next step in making Colleton County a pet-friendly community.







## Paws at the Plantation

The beautiful Pineland Plantation hosted Paws at the Plantation again this year on March 2 raising just over \$11,000 for the animals of Colleton County. Despite the threat of rain leading up to the event, the night was warm and delightful.







Most foster assignments are 2-3 weeks and FoCCAS provides food, crates, medicine, etc. All you need to have is a safe place and lots of love.



# National Geographic Wild highlights Serenity from CCAS

Unfortunate circumstances made Serenity a television star in April. She came to the shelter suffering from gunshot wounds. The shelter, with financial backing from FoCCAS, decided to send her to Dr. Henri Bianucci, an orthopedic surgeon at Veterinary Specialty Care in Charleston. The initial thought was to amputate the injured leg, but Dr. Bianucci was able to save the leg. This was all captured on film for National Geographic Wild's Animal ER Live.

After surgery, Dr. Lori Campbell fostered and cared for Serenity. When they returned for a follow up visit, CCAS director Laura Clark and Campbell participated live on television. The picture above shows that Serenity also listened intently to the instructions.

Serenity drew attention to the sad fact that it is not unusual for dogs to come into rural county shelters with gunshot wounds. She also showed that she, like so many other shelter dogs, is amazing. She (and others like her) deserves to have a wonderful life in a loving home.

#### **Shelter News**

We have a new name! Effective May 1st, we changed our name to **Colleton County Animal Services**. The change was made to better reflect how our agency interacts with and for the community. The agency still oversees the functions of animal control (law enforcement), animal sheltering, litter enforcement and mosquito abatement but we are working hard to become a resource for our community of pet owners and lovers. As part of the restructuring, Laura Clark has assumed the position of Director, overseeing the administrative, animal control and animal sheltering activities and Reginald McNeil has assumed the position of Operations Manager, overseeing the daily operations of the facility, mosquito abatement and litter enforcement and occasional animal control activities as needed. We are continuing to upgrade and improve our facilities and have added 2 new shed buildings to improve the quarantine procedures and animal flow. Nadia Siekert, kennel assistant, has been promoted to a Shelter Medical Technician and we've hired a new kennel assistant, Karen Klein. We are accepting applications to fill the vacant Kennel Assistant position left by Nadia.

#### **Shelter Mobile**

The animal shelter was excited to recently receive a Chevrolet Tahoe, a former Sheriff's Office vehicle, in order to transport shelter pets to rescues and to vet appointments. The vehicle was customized to suit the shelter's needs and decorated with paws and other items to help spread the message to spay, neuter, adopt!

#### May half price adoptions

Thanks to the generosity of Cam Wills with Coastal Pain Care, we are offering ½ price adoptions on all dogs and cats adopted during the month of May! So far, 6 dogs and 13 cats have been adopted.

### Colleton Animal Commitment Education (CACE)

Carol Armentrout, Dr. Rebecca Hughes, and Janice Young had another successful year presenting the CACE program to 4<sup>th</sup> graders in Colleton County. They visited 5 schools and 15 different classes to teach the Pet Responsibility Program.

Each school participated in the Speuter Essay contest about the importance of spaying or neutering your pets. The winners were:

The CACE Team will also visit Black Street Early Childhood Center to share the pet safety videos.

This program would not be successful without the support of the Colleton County School District, school principals, teachers, librarians, and students. A special thank you to Jacquie Miller, Audra Hudson, Jeannette Neal, Debra Kane, and Stephen Cinader with Lucky Blue for helping to spread the word. This year, a generous donation arrived from Pilots N Paws including t-shirts, books, coloring books, and bookmarks. Each school library received a copy of *Radar*, the story of a shelter dog.

The Colleton Animal Commitment Education Program was piloted in the Spring of 2015, and since then, 4<sup>th</sup> graders throughout Colleton County have learned the importance of pet responsibility. Topics include how to safely meet a new animal, the importance of spaying and neutering, how long a pet will live, and the effects of heartworms on a dog. Students exercise skills in writing and math throughout the program. This curriculum meets the Good Citizenship Standards for 4<sup>th</sup> graders in South Carolina.
